MARCH 2022

We have a had a great start to 2022, following the success of our Annual Scientific Meeting (ASM) which was held from 10-13 March at the Hilton Hotel, Sydney. We are accustomed to navigating COVID restrictions and quarantining requirements, but we have proved that the addition of force majeures in the form of biblical proportion floods does not stop the ASM from going ahead and being a huge success. Thank you to everyone who attended this year. I was fortunate to be able to attend virtually from Perth but very much look forward to attending in-person in 2023.

I am so pleased that we had over 120 delegates attend in person and for the first time ever, we delivered a hybrid meeting, with over 40 delegates from WA and New Zealand attending virtually.

We are in the process of collecting official feedback from our delegates, as we are always looking at ways to ensure that our ASM's meet the expectations of our members however the feedback I have received thus far has been overwhelmingly positive. The opportunity for people to reconnect and partake of an excellent scientific program has been achieved. Another highlight was the collaboration with the British Society of Neuroradiology (BSNR) and the neuroradiology section of the Singapore Radiological Society (SRS).

I'd like to acknowledge and extend my sincere thanks for the excellent work done in convening the 2022 ASM to, Andrew Cheung and Nathan Manning. Also, I'd like to extend a huge thank you to the members of the scientific committee: Scott Davies, Graham Dunn, Jennifer Gillespie, and Kevin Tay. The team assembled an outstanding education program which extended over 3 ½ days with concurrent sessions for Diagnostic Neuroradiology/Head and Neck Radiology and Interventional Neuroradiology.

Constitutional Amendment Passed

The ANZSNR wishes to seek Deductible Gift Recipient (DGR) status and as such is required by the Australian Tax Office (ATO) to meet the following condition:

The organisation must be required to transfer the following surplus assets to a gift deductible fund, authority or institution when it is wound up or its endorsement is revoked (whichever occurs first):

- gifts and deductible contributions made to the organisation for its principal purpose
- · money received by the entity because of such gifts and contributions.

For DGRs that are registered charities, the transfer must be to another DGR, with similar objects, which is charitable at law.

This requirement may be set out in a law, in an organisation's constituent documents or in separate rules governing an organisation's activities.

ANZSNR members unanimously voted for the addition of a new clause 54.1 to the constitution to meet the ATO requirements

54. Winding up and Revocation

54.1 If the organisation is wound up or its endorsement as a deductible gift recipient is revoked (whichever occurs first), any surplus of the following assets shall be transferred to another organisation with similar objects, which is charitable at law, to which income tax deductible gifts can be made:

- gifts of money or property for the principal purpose of the organisation
- contributions made in relation to an eligible fundraising event held for the principal purpose of the organisation
- money received by the organisation because of such gifts and contributions.

The approved clause has been added to the constitution and the final application to the ATO for DGR status will be made over the coming weeks.

INR as a specialty consultation—Update

RANZCR is applying for recognition of Interventional Neuroradiology as a separate field of specialty practice within the specialty of Radiology in Australia.

Fields of specialty practice define specialty medical health services in Australia, for example, Cardiology and Rheumatology are recognised Physician fields of specialty practice while Neurosurgery and Urology are fields of specialty practice within Surgery. Existing fields of specialty practice within Radiology include Diagnostic Ultrasound, Diagnostic Radiology and Nuclear Medicine.

Currently there is no recognition of Interventional Neuroradiology by the Medical Board of Australia (MBA) and the Australian Health Practitioner Regulation Agency (AHPRA). This inadvertently restricts patient access to these specialist services and reduces visibility to the wider community, which limits patient choice and the ability to consistently offer state of the art minimally invasive technologies that have been proven to improve patient health outcomes. The flow on effects of the status means that these services are not reliably included, nor considered, in health service and infrastructure decisions made by various health departments and other relevant authorities.

RANZCR wishes to formalise recognition of specialist practice for Interventional Neuroradiology to ensure equitable patient access to Interventional Neuroradiology services and its workforce in metropolitan, rural, regional, and remote locations. Designating Interventional Neuroradiology as a field of specialty practice within the specialty of Radiology will not impact the scope of practice for other medical specialties.

Currently RANZCR is preparing to submit an application to AHPRA and is seeking feedback from key stakeholders from both within and out of the specialty.
